
Where to Vote:

You can vote at Cordes Lakes Community Center their address is 16357 S. Cordes Lakes Dr. and they will be open from 6:00 am-7:00 pm on Nov 3rd. If you live closer to Dewey-Humboldt, then you can vote at Gateway Baptist Church at 12900 E. Prescott Dells Ranch Road.

Ballot Info:

Congressional, state and local candidates are represented, like James Gregory for Board of Supervisors, District 2 and David Rhodes for County Sheriff. Adding a write-in candidate is offered as an alternative for all positions. Some positions involve voting for more than one candidate. Your vote for some judges involves the decision whether or not to retain them in office.



Propositions:

207: State Legalization of Non-Medical Marijuana

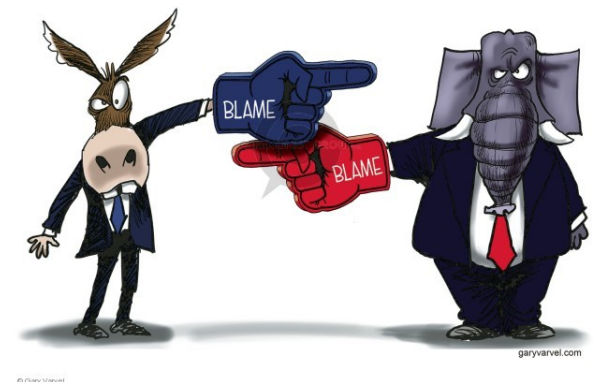
The law would allow limited marijuana possession, use, and cultivation by adults 21 or older; amend criminal penalties for marijuana possession; ban smoking marijuana in public; impose a 16% excise tax on marijuana sales to fund public programs; authorize state/local regulation of marijuana licenses; and allow expungement of some marijuana offenses.

208: Education Funding

A yes vote would signify you support a 3.5 percent income tax "surcharge" on individual earnings above \$250,000 and on married couples earning more than \$500,000. The revenue is split: 50% goes towards hiring and increasing the base compensation for teachers and classroom support personnel; 25% for hiring and increasing the base compensation of student support services, such as classroom aides and transportation; 12% for funding the Career Training and Workforce Fund; 10% for mentoring and retention programs for new teachers and 3% would go towards the Arizona Teachers Academy.

1. Denying Federal funding to “sanctuary cities” that do not comply with Federal immigration laws.
2. Prohibiting abortion except when it is necessary to prevent the death of the mother.
3. Making permanent the tax relief provisions of the tax cuts and jobs act of 2017.
4. Adding “sexual orientation,” “gender identity,” and “gender expression” to the protected classes of race, religion, age, sex and ancestry in nondiscrimination law.
5. Enacting Federal tax credits for donations to state-based scholarship programs to provide educational options such as private or homeschools.
6. Providing any direct or indirect Federal funding to Planned Parenthood and other entities that provide abortions.
7. Protecting individuals and business from being required to provide services or use their artistic expression in a manner that violates their moral or religious beliefs.

Electoral College

When you vote for the presidential candidate you are actually voting for the electors from the Electoral College, who select the president/vice president. The electors are listed under the name of each candidate. Arizona has 11 electors, which is the number of representatives we have in Congress.



Voting:

How do you vote? You can vote by mail with the Permanent Early Voting List (PEVL). It is a one time requested early ballot, and you can also vote early in person. Or, the most popular way to vote is to vote in person on election day, which is open from 6am to 7pm. And make sure to bring a valid ID when voting.
